
Our Neighbourhood News

How can we, as a community, do things better than what is going on in the world?


- Respond to the horrific wars in Gaza and Ukraine with kindness

Why Our Neighbourhood Must Have a Ring Road

The traffic moving through our neighbourhood already worries many of us. Taking a walk ourselves or encouraging children to walk or bike to school feels more and more risky, especially since most of our streets don't have sidewalks.

The bad news is that within the next few years, subway construction together with the influx of thousands of new residents in the many towers to be built on both sides of Yonge Street means the situation is going to get a whole lot worse. Many, many more local drivers, plus people avoiding local traffic snarls will be rushing through our streets. Although those living closest to Yonge Street will feel the greatest impact, it will ripple out to almost every street in the GARA area.



How can our neighbourhood be protected?

Just south of us, there is a relatively simple solution that has worked well. When the area around the North York Civic Centre and Mel Lastman Square was being redeveloped, in order to protect the neighbourhood to the east, a ring road, Doris Avenue, was included in the overall plan. A ring road allows traffic to by-pass the major road but not access the quiet residential side streets. Traffic moves smoothly without rushing down quiet residential streets.

How could this work for us?

Dudley Avenue could be our ring road. Physically blocking cars from cutting through Highland Park and Woodward Avenues would discourage a great deal of through traffic in the whole area. We have been told Grandview Avenue has to be left open to allow access for emergency services but other plans are being considered to discourage unnecessary traffic on that street.

We need this type of traffic protection built into the current planning process. It is crucial not to wait until construction has already happened, traffic patterns established and we are being hammered by the entirely predictable tidal wave of speeding cars.

Keith Irish, our Ward 1 Councillor, is proposing that money be set aside in the next city budget to fund public consultation. We'd love to hear your thoughts on the matter. Let us know at garathornhill@gmail.com



Beautiful Nature Close to Home

Whether walking, hiking or biking, nature offers recreation and exercise for the entire family. It also provides an amazing way to rejuvenate and find tranquility, natural beauty and biodiversity in our urban surroundings.

Here are some suggestions to enjoy nature in our backyard or explore a little further afield.

Pomona Mills Park

Located at John and Henderson, Pomona Park has a beautiful 3 km walking path on both sides of the Don River. Thanks to an active group of conservationists, the park is home to a wide range of native trees and shrubs and a meadow of wildflowers. Pack a picnic or play frisbee in the meadow on the west side of Henderson.

Bestview Park

Bestview Park (Laureleaf Rd. S. and Bestview Dr.) is the trailhead into the Don River valley. It is an urban oasis with ravines and forests and a paved path that is ideal for walking or bike riding. Explore a side trail to discover more of the nature the park has to offer.

Edwards Gardens

Edwards Gardens, located at Leslie and Lawrence, is a botanical garden featuring perennials and roses at the entrance and wildflowers, rhododendrons and an extensive rockery in the valley. It is especially stunning in spring when flowers and shrubs are in bloom. The path connects into the Sunnybrook Park trail system. York Regional Forest

York Regional Forest comprises 22 hiking trails spanning a total of over 150 kilometres. There are 13 trails in the Whitchurch-Stouffville area easily reachable from Highway 404. York Regional Forest includes 4 accessible trails, enabling everyone to enjoy the forest. www.york.ca/environment/forests/york-regional-forest

McMichael Canadian Art Collection and ravine

The McMichael Canadian Art Collection, located in Kleinburg, show-cases the Group of Seven and other Canadian landscape artists. Beautifully situated in 100 acres of forested land in the Humber River valley, it contains a network of paths and hiking trails. The gallery offers art classes for adults and children and summer camps for kids. https://mcmichael.com

For a handy way to identify plants and animals that you observe on your nature outings, download the Seek app by iNaturalist onto your mobile device. Hold the camera over the object in question and the name of the species will appear.



A Message from Our Councillor

Thank you for the opportunity to share this update with GARA members.

Transit Station Area Density

I have written previously in my biannual newsletters to Thornhill residents

that the Region of York, through its Major Transit Station Areas, and the province through its Transit Oriented Communities, require areas around GO Transit stations, subways and bus rapid transit lines be intensified.

As a refresher...

MTSA: the 800-metre radius area (representing a 10 to 15 minute walk) around an existing or planned public transit station. Thornhill has three MTSAs: Yonge at Royal Orchard, Yonge at Clark, and Yonge at Steeles.

TOC: mixed-use high density residential and commercial buildings built around new public transit stations with boundaries determined by the province. Thornhill has a TOC at the Langstaff Gateway (and another at Richmond Hill Centre immediately north of Highway 407).

At time of writing the city has two active high-density development applications along the Yonge Corridor in the Grandview neighbourhood and within the Steeles MTSA: 7115 Yonge Street and 8 to 14 Grandview Avenue (next to Golden Star Burgers) AND 7079 Yonge Street (northeast corner of Yonge and Woodward).

The City of Markham is studying the Yonge Corridor to determine the land use, parks, infrastructure, and community amenities (including schools) needed to support future growth.

Work on the **Yonge Corridor Secondary Plan** has been underway for 18 months and there are more opportunities for public engagement planned this year. Stay up-to-date, including reading the Interim Report, by visiting and registering here: https://yourvoicemarkham.ca/yongecorridor

Bayview John Visioning Exercise

The city is working on developing a vision for the "Thornhill Local Centre" located in the Bayview Avenue and John Street area from the perspective of Urban Design, Built Form, Land Uses; Transportation & Mobility; and, Community Uses.

Three very well attended public engagement sessions were held at the Thornhill Community Centre in January and February. A preliminary staff report is expected in June 2025 and I will hold a Community Information Meeting to solicit feedback on the report later this year.
